



We recognize and support students in all majors who strive toward artistic and scholarly excellence.











Hague Convention of 1954 Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict

The Blue Shield is the internationally recognized symbol that identifies cultural property subject to protection during armed conflict. Use of the Blue Shield is defined in Article 8, chapters 16 and 17 of The 1954 Hague Convention. "Hague 1954 seeks to preserve cultural property from damage or destruction. UNESCO 1970 supports retention of cultural property by source nations. These different emphases - one cosmopolitan, the other nationalist; one protective, the other retentive-characterize two ways of thinking about cultural property. I refer to them as "cultural internationalism" and "cultural nationalism John Henry Merryman

"Archaeologists often argue that antiquities have no meaning outside their archaeological contexts. If we don't know where they were found, they argue, antiquities are meaningless and only of aesthetic value, which they judge to be subjective and inferior to the "objective" value of the excavated antique artifact." Shane Simpson, NGA lawyer recommends

- Contact the Indian Central Bureau of Investigation,
 which monitors the illicit trade, and Indian diplomatic
 officials to see if they objected to the purchase.
- Ask Raj Mehgoub, the alleged former owner, to provide documentation on the Shiva's legal export from India.
- Ask Kapoor for documents about his purchase of the Shiva from Mehgoub.
- Confer with leading Indian experts on Chola art














