

THE PRESIDENCY AT MASSART

In the past few months, David Nelson has presented to our community a model of leadership that he believes reflects the identity, work, and values of the MassArt community. I feel this model has given me a healthy perspective from which to approach our work in all areas of Academic Affairs and simultaneously reach across to other areas of the college to center the public mission of the college in collaborate ways.

This model is rooted in sense-making, consensus building, and shared governance.
